Pope's New Year message: "Accept each other"

Pope Francis, laying out his hopes for the just-begun year, urged people to work for a world where everyone accepts each other's difference and where enemies recognize that they are brothers. "We are all children of one heavenly father, we belong to the same human family and we share a common destiny," the pope said. "This brings a responsibility for each to work so that the world becomes a community of brothers who respect each other, accept each other in one's diversity, and takes care of one another," the pope said. Setting aside his prepared text for a moment, he expressed impatience with violence in the world. "What is happening in the heart of man? What is happening in the heart of humanity?" "It's time to stop." Earlier, during his homily at New Year's Mass in St. Peter's Basilica, Francis spoke of humanity's journey in the year unfolding and invoked what he said where "words of blessing," explaining that they are "strength, courage and hope." "Not an illusory hope," he added, "based on frail human promises, or a naïve hope which presumes that the future will be better simply because it is the future." "I, too, believe that it will be good for us to stop ourselves in this path of violence and search for peace," Francis said. In his remarks to the often-applauding crowd, he also expressed hope that "the gospel of brotherhood speak to every conscience and knock down the wall that impede enemies from recognizing that they are brothers."

Baptism of the Lord

A YOUNG MAN, a carpenter by trade, set out from the small village of Nazareth. He had heard that the son of a kinswoman of his mother Mary was preaching and proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins by the Jordan River. He must have walked east along dirt roads for at least a full day towards that distance river valley. Today, as his followers, we journey with him. Will the words of the Prophet Isaiah that we hear in the first reading - "come to me; listen, so that you may live" - quicken our steps? What does baptism mean for us? Is it a dramatic break from our sinful past and a new commitment to love God and obey his commandments, as John says? Sinless in a sinful society, Jesus came to the river. As John the Baptist prayed and the water poured over him, Jesus shared in our human burden. The heavens broke. A heavenly voice affirmed his divinity. His salvific work with and among us began. Are we continuing to walk with him? This Sunday marks the end of the Christmas season and the beginning of Ordinary Time in our liturgical year. The hope of Christmas, though, never ends. We can feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, heal a wounded, broken planet and find the promised peace our baptism offers. *Michael Dougherty, Whitehorse, YT.*
