FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY INTO HEAVEN -
 AUGUST 15, 2014
 PRAYER OF POPE PIUS XII
 WHO PROCLAIMED THE DOGMA OF THE ASSUMPTION

O Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God and Mother of men. We believe with all the fervor of our faith in your triumphal Assumption, both in body and soul, into heaven, where you are acclaimed as Queen by all the choirs of angels and all the legions of saints; and we unite with them to praise and bless the Lord who has exalted you above all other pure creatures, and to offer you the tribute of our devotion and our love. We know that your gaze, which on earth watched over the humble and suffering humanity of Jesus, is filled in heaven with the vision of that Humanity glorified, and with the vision of Uncreated Wisdom; and that the joy of your soul in the direct contemplation of the adorable Trinity causes your heart to throb with overwhelming tenderness. And we, poor sinners, whose body weighs down the flight of the soul, beg you to purify our hearts, so that, while we remain here below, we may learn to see God, and God alone, in the beauties of His creatures. We trust that your merciful eyes may deign to glance down upon our miseries and our sorrows, upon our struggles and our weaknesses; that your countenance may smile upon our joys and our victories; that you may hear the voice of Jesus saying to you of each one of us, as He once said to you of His beloved disciple: behold thy son. From the shadows of this vale of tears, we seek in your heavenly assistance and tender mercy comfort for our aching hearts and help in the trials of the Church and of our fatherland. We believe, finally, that in the glory where you reign, clothed with the sun and crowned with the stars, you are, after Jesus, the joy and gladness of all the angels and of all the saints. And from this earth, over which we tread as pilgrims, comforted by our faith in the future resurrection, we look to you, our life, our sweetness, and our hope; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

WHAT IF PETER had listened the first time? "Take heart, it is I: do not be afraid," Jesus told him when Peter became fearful at seeing Christ walk on water. Why did Peter have to ask for proof: And why such dramatic proof? Peter was quite bold in making demands of Jesus. How different might the story have been if Peter had calmed down, sat back and waited for Jesus to reach the boat? On the surface, not much would have changed. The wind would have ceased, and the disciples would still have that revelation of the reality of Jesus. Most paintings of this scene show a stern, commanding Jesus on the water. However, by now Jesus must have known what to expect from Peter. Perhaps a knowing, loving, grin might be more appropriate for these portraits. That's how I like to imagine Christ when I finally realize the truth of a situation. Like Peter, I take a lot of convincing, especially when God is involved. We long for instant solutions and dramatic signs. We are all Peter. If Peter had thought a moment, he might have taken a lesson from Elijah, who waited for the silence. We're not good at silence. And we're not good at listening, especially listening to God. Perhaps we all need to pray often the first verse of today's Psalm. "Let me hear what God the Lord will speak."

Hospital Chaplaincy & Caring for the Sick

Each hospital has a Catholic Priest Chaplain to give the Sacrament of the Sick and the Sacrament of Reconciliation to any patient desiring these Sacraments. In addition, there are Eucharistic Ministers who bring Holy Communion daily to the Catholic patients at the hospitals. Often a patient is too ill to ask for a priest. Therefore, it is important for a family member helping the patient being admitted to the hospital, to place the name of the sick person on the Catholic list for St. Regis Parish. Then, the priests and religious who check the Sick List will know that the patient would like them to visit and bless them with the graces of the Sacraments. Massena Memorial Hospital, Father Mark Reilly and Father Don Manfred, as well as Deacon Tom Proulx, Sister Maureen, and Sister Juliana, provide daily visits to Catholic patients. At Champlain Valley Physicians Hospital in Plattsburgh, Father Bill Reamer is the Catholic Chaplain. Monsignor Dennis Duprey and Father Timothy Canaan also visit the sick. At Alice Hyde Hospital in Malone, Father Joseph Giroux, Father Christopher Looby, and Religious Sisters assist the Catholic patients. At Cornwall Hotel Dieu Hospital, Father Halley is the Catholic Chaplain daily and Father Jerome Pastores visits the sick each week. The General Hospital in Ottawa and Fletcher-Allen Hospital in Burlington also have Catholic priests available to help the sick and their families. At Home on St.Regis Reservation, Father Anthony visits the sick and gives the Sacrament of Anointing to the sick and homebound and Sister Mary Christine takes Holy Communion each week to the sick in their homes and to the residents of the two nursing homes: IAH KHI SOH THA and TSI ION KWA NONH SO: TE
