<b>Church Cleaners</b> Niawenkowa to Donna's team	<b>We celebrate Our Blessed Mother's birthday on Monday, September 8<sup>th</sup>.</b> The Church has celebrated Mary's birth since at least the sixth century. Scripture does not give an account of Mary's birth. However, the apocryphal <i>Protoevangelium of James</i> reflects the development of Christian piety. According to this account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child that will advance God's plan of salvation for the world. Such a story (like many biblical counterparts) stresses the special presence of God in Mary's life from the beginning. St. Augustine connects Mary's birth with Jesus' saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and shine forth in the light of her birth. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed." The opening prayer at Mass speaks of the birth of Mary's Son as the dawn of our salvation and asks for an increase of peace. We can see every human birth as a call for new hope in the world. The love of two human beings has joined with God in His creative work. The loving parents have shown hope in a world filled with travail. The new child has the potential to be a channel of God's love and peace to the world. This is all true in a magnificent way in Mary. If Jesus is the perfect expression of God's love, Mary is the foreshadowing of that love. Birthday celebrations bring happiness to the celebrant as well as to family and friends. Next to the birth of Jesus, Mary's birth offers the greatest possible happiness to the world. Each time we celebrate her birth we can confidently hope for an increase of peace in our hearts and in the world at large.

### Sunday Meditation

Today's readings suggest something about the difficulties of building and sustaining community. We all belong to various communities—our family, our classroom or workplace, our parish, our neighborhood -- and we know how easily conflicts can arise. Within the life of a community there are frequently disagreements or resentment. We may have to find the courage to speak up when problems arise. Sometimes members of the group may need gentle correction or even firm discipline. "Love your neighbor" is simple enough to say but very difficult to live! There are times when we may wonder whether harmonious human community is even possible. If we can keep an open and listening heart, as today's psalm advises, we will be a better able to discern the voice of God in the midst of our messy efforts to live and work together. IN the Gospel, Jesus assures us that the is with us in even the smallest gathering "in my name." While we usually interpret this as referring to gatherings for prayer or worship, our faith tells us that God is present among us in every circumstance of our lies. Living in our various communities will never be easy. Let us pray for the grace to discern God's presence at the heart of those communities, encouraging and supporting us in our struggles to love our neighbor as ourself. *Krystyna Higgins, Fredericton, NB*
