Saint Matthew September 21st

The apostle Matthew has two names in the Gospels: Matthew and Levi. Since only the name Matthew is entered in any scriptural mention of the 12 apostles, it is commonly held that his name was Levi until Jesus called him to be a disciple, then he was called Matthew which means "gift of God" in Aramaic.

Mark and Luke record that Levi, the son of Alphaeus, was sitting in the tax office when the Lord called him. A Jewish tax collector for the Romans, Matthew would have been considered impure and socially unacceptable by the Jewish community.

After Pentecost, Matthew worked in the church made up mostly of Jews who believed that Jesus was the Savior. The Gospel bearing his name was composed around AD85 and written for Jewish-Christians. In it, Jesus is shown as the fulfillment of God's Old Testament promises of a Messiah. In the current liturgical year, the Sunday readings focus on Matthew's Gospel. Notice how often Matthew says, "As it is written", or "This is the one of whom the prophet spoke," or "All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet."

Tradition holds that after the Resurrection, Matthew preached in Ethiopia, where he was martyred. He is a patron saint of customs officers and accountants.

Sunday Meditation

A place like "Cash Corner" in Calgary is one of many places in our world where the unemployed wait each day, hoping for work. If you have ever been out of work yourself, you will know the feelings of unworthiness and worry the workers in today's Gospel experienced. Who would ever hire them again? How would they support their families? Could they survive? The more desperate they would become. Today's Gospel makes it clear these laborers are not lazy. They go to work even at the eleventh hour, having no wage agreement. Imagine their joy, then, and their experience of liberation when they are given exactly what they need: not "minimum" wage, but a "living" wage that will provide a day's subsistence for each family. Now imagine we are speaking about salvation instead of employment. For what can we hope? Because our God is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, good to all and compassionate, we know we are not disadvantaged by coming to faith later rather than earlier, by being regular disciples instead of "The Twelve," by feeling less deserving of God's grace than we perceive our neighbor to be. In thanks, then, we give ourselves over to loving union with Christ, who has revealed and offered freely God's boundless ways of love for all humankind.
