All Saints November 1 This feast honors all the saints of the Church, known and unknown. The occasion provides an opportunity to reflect on the nature of sainthood and to celebrate the exemplary faithfulness of holy men and women of every place and time whose lives and deeds continue to inspire us. Originally a feast in the Eastern Church for all martyrs, it was extended to the whole Roman Church in the 9th Century as a feast including non-martyrs. It was given this date, November 1, to counter a pagan feast on the same day. In England it was called Allhallows. ('Hallow' is from the Old English word for 'Holy'.) Thus 'Hallowe'en', a vestige of this pagan celebration, is from 'Allhallows even,' or 'the eve of All Saints.'

All Souls' Day November 2 Since the early Church, Christians have prayed for the dead. By the 7th century, some monastic foundations reserved this day to pray for deceased members and benefactors. In 988, Odilo, abbot of the great monastery of Cluny in France, established the tradition of keeping, "with joyous affection, the memory of all the faithful departed who have lived from the beginning of the world until the end." By the 14th century, the commemoration had spread through Europe and was universally accepted in the Latin Church.

Sunday Meditation

As the end of the Church year nears, our readings will contain warnings to be prepared to meet the Lord when he comes again. On the final Sunday of the year, Christ the King, we will hear how Christ will judge us: Just as you did it to the least...you did it to me. Today's readings give us a heads-up, for their message is similar. The First Reading says, "You shall not wrong or oppress... you shall not abuse any widow or orphan." In the Gospel, Jesus says there are two great commandments. To love God is the first; the second is similar: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." These two commandments sum up Scripture ("the law and the Prophets"). God's message in a nutshell is to love God and love your neighbor. We show we love God by loving our neighbor. Faith is not just spiritual or intellectual. It demands our whole life; it must be lived. We must be rooted, first, in our relationship with God, that is the source of all. Providing focus and direction. That relationship-our love for God-must bear fruit in love for others. Our relationship with God is made manifest-- made credible-- in our love for our neighbor. And our neighbor is everyone, especially the weak, especially the needy. To revise the old maximum: Neighborly-ness is next to Godliness!
